


#### WEESAGEECHAK IS POUNDING IT OUT WITH A FULL BLOWN FANCY DANCE!



Weesageechak Begins to Dance, Native Earth's best-known festival of new works by Native artists from across the country finds a new home this year at the Dancemakers Centre for Creation, down the hall from Native Earth headquarters in the Distillery District, from September 15th -18th, 2005.







Julia Jamieson brings her solo dance My Baby You'll Be: Ankewi:ra enkenhake to the festival, while Christine Friday-Keeshig presents three contemporary works: Metamorphosis,

Saskatchewan playwright Mark Dieter's play RRAP takes a scathing look at band politics and on-reserve housing, while returning Weesageechak writer **Dawn Dumont** (Four Directions, Nicimis) examines fancydancing from a place of survival and rage with her one-woman FancyDancina.



Weesageechak will also present scenes from The Death of a Chief, an adaptation of Julius Caesar, by William Shakespeare, featuring Michelle St John, Jani Lauzon, Ryan Cunningham, Cheri Maracle-Cardinal, Craig Lauzon, Monique Mojica, and Michaela Washburn.



In addition, the festival launches its Young Voices Initiative this season, showcasing the work of six emerging playwrights who have been working with professional theatre artists to develop their playwriting skills. Excerpts from the work of Amy White, Waawaate Fobister, Clifford Cardinal, Lena Recollet, Matt Poushinsky and Stephen Reid will be featured on the second night of the festival.

### GOODBYE LARRY



Native Earth Performing Arts sends love and peace to the spirit of our Nisga'a brother, Larry Guno, who died suddenly on Sunday July 17<sup>th</sup> at his home in Terrace BC. Larry - a playwright, former MLA and lawyer - was nearing a completed draft of his first play, *Bunk #7* which was set to debut in our 2005/2006 season at the Factory Studio. Larry was

proud to be sharing the experiences he collected as a student in one of Canada's many residential schools in the fifties and sixties. His remarkably positive nature highlighted memories of friends, a family away from

home, and music of the era that kept the boys company during the quiet times. We are humbled by h is accomplishments and inspired by



his ability to emerge from such a strained environment with heartening stories and a strong urge to better the state of our people.

"Oh God, at this moment we are all thinking of home, of our families, of the places that we miss, we thank you for all the beautiful things like the sea, the sound of the breakers rolling in, the call of the raven, the quiet murmur of the rivers, the sound of the voices of our forefathers from the forest and most of all God the mountains and all our relations."

SEASON CHANGE

It takes a long time and a lot of work to develop a play for the stage. Although Larry Guno had been working on *Bunk # 7* (formerly O'Keefe) for nearly four years, the play was not yet ready to be produced, and all the development scheduled for this season leading up to the February production – workshops, dramaturgy, rewrites - stopped with his untimely death

Cancelling the anticipated production of *Bunk # 7* created a hole in the Native Earth season. Instead of just throwing something up – a production takes a long time and a lot of planning – we decided to spend our energy on second-stage development of two pieces that are coming up at Native Earth in future seasons.

Stalker, a play by Dawn Dumont that has been in development here since Weesageechak XVI, will receive a two week workshop and have a three day public showing at the Factory Studio February 17th - 19th. Stalker looks at the relationship between two university students that escalates to violence, and how their community deals with the fallout. It challenges the idea of circle sentencing and the



responsibility of a community to police its members.

Two weeks later, audiences will get a sneak preview of a revised and redesigned Annie Mae's Movement, a production that will tour Canada in 2006, and Australia and New Zealand in 2007/2008. In the five years since its Native Earth production, two men have been charged with the 1976 murder of the Nova Scotia activist. How will that affect the play? Come and see, March 3<sup>rd</sup>-5<sup>th</sup>, once again at the Factory

# FROM PAGE TO STAGE TO PAGE AGAIN



Playwrights Canada Press recently published two of Darrell Dennis' plays together in a single volume: Tales Of An Urban Indian and The Trickster of Third Avenue East. Both plays premiered at Native Earth Performing Arts, and now you can own your very own copy. Another recent offering from the press is Penny Gummerson's Wawatay, which made an early appearance at Weesageechak several years ago, before going on to be produced at the Firehall in Vancouver, at SNTC in Saskatoon, and elsewhere.



These books, and others (like the anthology Staging Coyote's Dream, edited by Monique Mojica and Ric Knowles) will be available at this year's Weesageechak Festival in the Distillery, September 15th -18th, or you can log on to the press website to order, or check with your local bookstore (ask them to order it for you, let's get some aboriginal plays on the shelves!). They can and they will with the latest manifestation of *The Scrubbing Project*, coming November 8 - 13, 2005 to Robert Gill Theatre at University of Toronto Campus. Originally performed at Factory Studio Theatre in November 2002, the issues explored in *The Scrubbing Project* are not static, and Turtle Gals' performance remains perpetually striking precisely because it rises to confront the issues as they evolve.

Genocide, internalized racism, ingested shame — it's hard to believe you'll be laughing and singing along, but the Turtle Gals' take is healing, not condemnation.

Recently Turtle Gals Performance Ensemble was celebrated by audiences at the Native Canadian Ceatre when they performed The Triple Truth as part of the 30th annual Maxworks Festival. Like that work, The Sarubbing Project is full of hard truths and poignant moments of clarity – that intangible sensation of being at a carrival where someone has died, but no on has turned off the rides yet. So terribly, terribly entertaining
